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

The appointment of a new teacher does not come under the Civil Service Commission. The salary rating at this school is \$65 per teaching month. I have your letter of the 27th ultimo, regarding the enquiry of your Board of School Commissioners, if it would be possible to enter into some arrangement with this Department, whereby white children, residing in the vicinity of the school, could be provided with educational facilities in the day school on the Millbrook reserve.

In reply might I say that a school is being conducted on the Millbrook reserve for the Indian children of that reserve, only. The Department is not intending to extend the facilities to provide for an increased attendance. This is a small building and provides only sufficient accommodation for the Indian children on the reserve. From our information, it is doubtful if there would be accommodation for other than the Indian children. However, the matter is being referred to the local Indian Agent for a report. On receipt of same, you will be further advised.

Dear Sir:

The Department has received a communication from the Secretary, Board of School Commissioners, Trure, N. S., in which he states that the Commissioners have been informed there is a possibility of the Department opening a school at the Reservation in Trure, where children other than Indians would be permitted to attend. The Secretary states there is, a short distance from the Indian reservation, within the limits of the town of Truro, quite a settlement of white people, who have no school privileges, and the Board enquire if it is possible to make some arrangements whereby the white children can attend the Indian school.

The Department understands that the school building on the Millbrook reserve provides classroom accommodation for only the children of the reserve. The Department is not contemplating any addition to the present school building, nor are we responsible for providing school facilities for white children.

I would request that you furnish a full report regarding the request of the Secretary of the Board of School Commissioners. Please state the number of pupils which the school on the Millbrook reserve will accommodate and also the total number of school age - 7 to 16 years on the reserve. Your early reply will be appreciated.



In reply to yours of July 7th, in reference to a communication you received from the Secretary, The Board of School Commissioners, Truro, I beg to say that at present on the Millbrook Reservation there are twenty four children of school age. Our School now has accommodation for twentyeight pupils and there is room in the present building for six more desks or twelve more pupils.

In conversation with the Chairman of the Truro School Board, I learn that there may be ten children from the section of Truro next our Reserve that would attend the Indian School. He suggested that a charge per pupil might be made by the Department of Indian Affairs to the Town. In our talk I suggested to him that should an arrangement be made where the Indian School would take care of a number of the white child-ren that we have the privilege of sending some of the boys to manuel training and some girls to Domestic Science classes in the town schools. He believed this could be satisfactorily arranged.

We mutually suggested that if an arrangement was made that the course of study would be the same as in all public schools in Nova Scotia and that therefore it would come under the inspection of the district School Inspector and result in the teacher receiving the Provincial grant which goes to all teachers in this Province.

Truro is facing a problem of either coming to some agreement with the Department of Indian Affairs respecting the School or erecting a building of their own to accomodate a comparative few children that are near our Reserve. It was pointed out by the Chairman of the Board that if Truro had the privilege of sending these children to the Indian School the commissioners could then put it up to the parents that they w would have to send their children to our school or else to the Willow Street School two and a half miles distant.

Reserve believe that a number of white children going to the school would have an influence that might get the Indian away from the idea that he must always be an Indian, never to rise above the status of a Government ward. Of course, there are some objectors both among the Indians and the whites, but they are of a small percentage.

Personally I feel that the Indian Children should be taught in accordance with the policy of the public schools of the Province so that should they advance sufficiently they would be able to continue their sutidies in the Provincial Normal or ether higher educational institutions. Or if the suggested agreement succeeds to the County Academy.

I do not believe there need be any financial outlay except for desks to make our school suitable to accomodate the surplus that is now a difficult problem for the Truro School Commission.

Dear Sir:

I wish to refer to your letter of the 13th ultime, with reference to the request of the Board of School Commissioners, Truro, that school facilities be provided in the Indian School on the Millbrook Reserve for 10 to 12 white children who reside adjacent to that reserve. Mr. Sutherland, who visited the school and reserve at the end of July, last, states that there would be accommodation for the above number of children, who reside just off the reserve, about 29 miles from the nearest white school in Truro. Mr. Sutherland discussed the matter of the admission of the white children with yourself and Mr. Doyle, of the Truro School Board. The Department would be prepared to grant the admission of the white children, on the following conditions:-

- per capita per annum on the average attendance these fees to be paid at the end of each school year the teacher of the school to keep accurate record of
 attendance of each white child.
 - If the Board of School Commissioners, Trure, will permit these Indian boys and girls on the Millbrook reserve who are qualified to take the course to attend the manual training and domestic science classes, respectively, in the Trure School nearest the reserve, without payment of tuition fees, the Department will agree that no tuition fees be charged for the white children attending the Millbrook Indian School. Should, however, the Board not agree to permit the Indian children to attend manual training and demestic science

classes in the white school, without payment of fees, the Department would charge at the rate mentioned for the white children attending the Millbrook school.

I would request that you take up this matter with the Board of School Commissioners and inform the Department, in the event of the white children attending the Indian School, if the Board will be prepared to allow the Indian children to attend manual training and domestic science classes in the white schools, in which event no fees would be charged by either party.



With this in mind, I intended to have Mrs. MacNeil, who had taught last year on this Reserve, placed as teacher at Millbrook. However when it became known that the Sisters would not be able to take over the new School, I was advised by the Department to retain Mrs. MacNeil and in addition, to if possible, obtain the services of another teacher. I was able to engage Mrs. Elsie Basque to teach with Mrs. MacNeil on the Reserve here, but it meant there was no teacher at Millbrook. After advertising in the papers, the result was I received six or seven applications and from these I selected one who seemed best qualified, Miss Mary B.Cameron, who is, I feel doing a very good job and I am quite satisfied with her work.

Your letter of March 18th, addressed to the Minister of this department, has been passed on to me for consideration and reply.

In this connection, I am sending forward for your information a copy of a report dated August 25, 1941, submitted to the Director of this branch by W. S. Arneil, Inspector of Indian Agencies, immediately following an investigation undertaken by him of conditions on Indian reserves in the provinces of Nova Scotia and P.S.I.

What we are siming at at the present time is the centralisation of the Indian population of Nova Sectia on two reserves - Eskasoni and Shubenacedie. It is just possible that there are at a number of reserves in the province Indians who, for the time being at least, are gainfully employed, and it is our intention that these Indians should not be disturbed. On the other hand, it is difficult to justify capital expenditures on our reserves that may be abandoned in the years immediately ahead of us. It would, I feel sure, be of value to you and of interest to the members of your Association if you could find an opportunity to visit the reserves where our new policy is now in force. In addition to this, it is my intention to pass on your letter with a copy of my reply to Mr. J. E. Morris, Acting Inspector of Indian Agencies for the Province of Quebec and the Maritime Provinces. Mr. Morris will, I feel sure, be glad to discuss the matter with you at the time of his next visit to Truro.

I wish to advise that our three displaced teachers; Miss Jennie Forbes, Afton, N.S.; Mrs. Mary MacNeil of Shubenacadie, NS., and Miss Hazel Bissett of Chapel Island, N.S., could be placed as follows:

1. Miss Jennie Forbes should be, and I have secured her consent, come to Eskasoni as a lay teacher while a Sister of the teaching Order is securing her license.

R. Mrs. Mary MacNeil of Shubenacadie, whose home is not far from Middle River, is anxious to teach there if a boarding-house can be found. The teachers' residence on that reserve was unoccupied for a number of years because the teacher was a local girl and could commute daily. While empty it was given to an Indian family, to the consent of Mr. Morris, Inspector, to allow decent accomodation for a blind Indian man whose wife was tubercular, and who were currently living in a disreputable shack. There is no house available for this family, should Mrs. MacNeil displace them. I will investigate more fully upon my next visit to Nyanza. Nyanza.

Miss Hazel Bissett of Chapel Island could go to the Truro school in Mr. Rice's Agency, which I think is vacant. Although Truro is approximately 150 miles from her home, I think she would find it easier to visit her aged relatives than if she were teaching at Middle River. There is a daily bus service between Truro and Miss Bissett's home, and it would allow her at least one monthly visit home. I have would allow her at least one monthly visit home. Thave written to ler accordingly, and have advised Mr. Rice to accept her, as she has done very good work in Chapel Island.

I trust you will agree with me and advise all concerned accordingly.
