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



Sir. I have the honor to call your attention to the unfortunate state of affairs now existing in connection with the Indian day school on the Saugeen Haservation. The facts as represented to us are these: Miss Cameron, the present teacher of the school has been in charge for about nine years, and during that period from evidence supplied us it would seem her services have been satisfactory. It appears, however, that an effort is now being made in the face of the protest of the majority of the Indians on the Reservation to have her removed and have another teacher of an another denomination put in her place. Miss Cameron is a member of the Methodist Church, and the majority of the Indians belong to the same body. A requisition signed by the Indians both at Saugeen and French Bay has been sent to us expressing the wish that Miss Ellen Cameron be allowed to continue to teach at least until the close of the year. Of course the school receives no grant from the Missionary Society, but the majority of the Indians being Methodists feel that under the circumstances their present teacher ought to be allowed to remain, and that some thing approaching denominational prejudice or preference on the part of the Agent enters asta motive into the attempt now made to discontinue the services of the present teacher. 

It would be impossible, I suppose, to secure a married man for less than \$400 per annum; but if the Department concurs in Mr Danard's recommendation, and will provide a salary of \$300, I will ask the Board of Missions for a supplementary grant of \$100. Wallace, teacher of the French Bay Indian school, on behalf of himself and the other teachers on the Rage Saugeen reserve for an increase of salary, I beg to say that the three schools on this reserve are entirely supported by the Band, which contributes \$500 annually for the salary of each teacher. This Band has a very large capital and might be able to stand the expenditure of an additional \$150.00 a year out of their interest.

Three hundred dollars is certainly a very small salary for a competent teacher of an Indian school. These schools were originally conducted by the Methodists, who contributed towards their support but the teachers are now wholly dependant on the salary paid by the Department. If it could be raised \$50.00 for each of them, I do not think it would be too much for white teachers of Indian schools in Western Ontario.

I may add that Mr Wallace came highly recommended and is still doing good work.

About two years ago we raised the salary of the teacher of the Moraviantown school and charged the increase to the Band.

The French Bay School was visited on May 3.

There are 20 children of school age in attandance, but the average runs between 12 and 15. The Teacher is very anxious to have an example of persistent truants made. He says he has asked the Agent to act but nothing has been done.

The attendance found consisted of 2 boys and 4 girls. This small attendance probably was to be attributed to there being a funeral upon the reserve to which most of the children had gone. The schoolroom is bright and clean, the Teacher brisk and energetic. He should have a regular attendance of twenty at least. The number of children of school age in this district is quite sufficient to maintain a large attendance, and if the Agent exercises the authority entrusted to him this can easily be done. The Indians themselves would be pleased to see attendance enforced.

The Teacher's house and stable are in good condition and the whole establishment is most creditable, but is not being as effective as it should be because proper control is not exercised. The co-operation of the Agent is needed for the exercise of such control.

The attendance has been irregular the quarter just closed owing largely to the foolish interference of the Indian Council with the truant officer. As your agent has rectified this error we will soon have a marked improvement in the attendance.

We have an Indian at French Bay named Peter moses, non-treaty, with three children of school age and they have not been in school one day this winter. They live one quarter mile from the school. This Peter Moses is a lazy-good-for-nothing fellow whom the perpartment pat off the reserve but was later allowed to come on again without the sanction of the Department. His three boys take the other children out of school. He should be disciplined in some way. They are a thieving gang.







Sir:

As you are aware, Mr. T. J. Wallace has been retired as teacher of the French Bay Indian Day School from the 30th of June, last, and it will be necessary to obtain the services of a qualified teacher to succeed him, to begin duties when the school re-opens after the present summer holidays.

I have, therefore, to request that you will endeavour to obtain the services of a teacher having, at least, second class professional qualifications. It might be advisable to consult the Public School Inspector, as he may be able to advise you. If you are unable to obtain a teacher through the efforts of yourself and the Inspector, you may advertise for one for the French Bay School, and also for the Saugeen Village School.

If teachers having, at least, second class professional qualifications are obtained, the Department will allow salary at the rate of \$500 per annum, which will be supplemented by any bonus provided by law.

The name, qualifications and experience of all applicants should be submitted to the Department for consideration and approval before the appointment is made.

The matter of obtaining teachers for both the French Bay and Saugeen Village Schools should receive your early attention, in order that teachers can be obtained in time to begin duties when the schools re-open after the holidays.

Cool, Inspector for this district, with regard to teachers for the French Bay and Indian Village Schools. He informs me that he does not know of anyone at present he could recommend and advises me to advertise. I would recommend that the Dept. authorize the advertising in two Daily papers for teachers for French Bay and the Indian Village School, stating salary as any qualified teacher in this district demands from \$900 to \$1200, and I do not think that I can secure a qualified teacher less that \$1000 perannum that would be satisfactory. I have to acknowledge receipt of your letter of the 4th instant, enclosing a communication from the Public School Inspector with reference to the obtaining of the services of teachers for the French Bay and Saugeen Village Schools.

In this connection I would refer you to official letter of the 9th instant, in which you were informed that you may advertise these vacancies, as recommended by you. You may place an advertisement in three issues of two daily papers for teachers having at least second class professional qualifications. You should state that the salary offered is at the rate of \$800 per annum, supplemented by a bonus of \$150 per annum; duties to commence September 4th, next; qualifications and experience to be stated. Applications should be forwarded to the Department before appointments are approved. before appointments are approved.

We note that qualified teachers in the district demand from \$900 to \$1200 per annum, but I would point out that the combined salary and bonus offered by the Department, amounting to \$950, is considered to be a fair salary, in view of the fact that living quarters are provided for the teachers.

You should place these advertisements as soon as possible, and all applications received by you should be forwarded for the consideration of the Department.


