- C----A barn is urgently needed but the school has no funds with which to erect it, as practically the entire Government grant each year and all the produce of the farm go to the support and education of the Indian children, who after all, are the wards of the Government. Would the Department be willing to vote us \$5.000.00 towards a new barn?
- been I have explained to Mr Duncan C. Scott who has always shown great interest in the welfare of our Indians, how by a small outlay, the class-rooms, play-rooms and dormitories could be enlarged, and provision be easily made for 20 or 30 more pupils. Larger in about play-rooms are much needed at the coast where he have be fruith rain
- ---Lastly, I am making an appeal in behalf of the Indian School in North Vancouver. The Department in all fairness should give them additional help or build them a new school. At present the children and the Sisters are packed like the proverbial sardines. For lack of funds they cannot better conditions. As at St Mary's (Mission B.C.) their little garden and orchard are heavily taxed. The per capita grant is barely enough to supply the children and Sisters with food. It is only by appealing to the charity of other institutions that they can make ends the Government; why should they be forced to beg, in be able to carry on their noble work?

I beg to submit for the approval of the Department the following alterations in the plans for new barns in course of construction, at Mission, B.C., for the St. Mary's Indian School, viz.:

1/---To enlarge 10 windows, 5 on each side, in the cows barn (sheet4) and to make them with 9 lights 10x14 instead of four lights.
2/---To place 2 new windows, 9 lights 10x14, on the North East side,

sheet 1. 3/---To place a new window in the maternity pen, 6 lights 10x12 4/---To remove window in calf pen from its present location to the South East corner of pen, and to enlarge it from 4 lights to 6 lights, 10x12. The present window admits in light only through the Hoist room, sheet 4.

5/---To enlarge windows in horses' stable and feed room from 4 lights to 6 lights 10x12.



fications, pages 28 & 29. REASONS FOR ABOVE ALTERATIONS:

We have a very mild climate here at St. Mary's. It rains very frequently. It is dark and cloudy the greater part of the year. Barns need as much light and possible. It is the experience of leading farmers and Experimental Farms in the District. It is recommended in fighting tuberculosis among the cattle.

MANGERS: --6/---To replace the 6 lifting mangers mentioned on page 18 of specifications, by steel divisions, B.T. book, fig. 54 page 55 of new catalog. Specifications call for me concrete mangers for 22 stalls. Lifting mangers are unnecessary if steel divisions are used. Lifting mangers do not last more than four years, the bottom must be replace after a year. Salt eats up the iron and the continual licking by cattle destroys it completely in a very short time. Concrete is more permanent and easier to clean.



However the windows on hinges and part of the present door as per plan are to be kept and a ladder to them is to be constructed.

Paper instead of being a protection, will become in some way a detriment to new building. I suggest to have none.


A letter has to-day been received from the Reverend Principal of the St. Mary's Mission Indian Boarding School, asking for a few minor changes in the plans and specifications for the barn now being built at the school by Mr. Brock. He asks that some of the items included in the specifications, such as the providing of building paper under sheeting of ceiling and on roof, and the hay carrier on the East end of the barn, also the swing pole and double door be omitted. By leaving out these items which he considers not necessary, a saving of \$105.00 will be made.

He has asked for authority to provide electric lighting for the barn, and has submitted a price from the contractor of \$348.00 for this work, which, by deducting the \$105.00 allowed for the changes in the plans will make a difference in the price for the lighting, of \$244.00.

As it is very unsafe to have Indian boys work around a large barn with the lanterns, I beg to recommend for your consideration, the advisability of having electric lights installed as asked for, at the price quoted by Mr. Brook, which is very reasonable for the work entailed. Cherrythr

In the Supplementary Estimates for the past fiscal year there was included an item for the payment of the taxes at the St. Mary's Boarding School, B. C. This item was in conjunction with that concerning a larger payment for the taxes at the Squamish Boarding School. You have already authorized the payment of the taxes at the last named institution for a second year, and arrangements are being made to vote the amount needed (roughly \$950) from year to year.

The taxes at St. Mary's are in the neighborhood of \$450. The amount is hardly large enough to vote from year to year; but, as the Rev. Father Welch, the Rev. Frincipal and the Indian Agent are all under the impression that we are to meet this obligation each year, I respectfully ask for your instructions.

I have examined the correspondence and memoranda in this connection and, although no promise was made to care for the taxes at St. Mary's from year to year, there is no definite statement to that effect.

to be mentioned in order to obtain from the Dpt. favorable consideration and approval. A large silo cannot be filled by hand. A blower, cutter and gas engine are required. Without them the silo may be an ornament on a farm, but its usefulness is practically nil. Will you be kind enough to recommend the purchase of these silo "complements". The barn is well put together and is a credit to the Architect who planned it, to the Contractor who built it and to the Dpt. that financed it. We all wish for a complete, compact and convenient barn. This desire explains the many requests contained in this letter.

The barn is completed with the exception of last coat of paint on the outside, which, owing to weather conditions cannot be given much before April or May. When you notify the Dpt., please bring to their attention the fact that Mr. Brock, the contractor, has given satisfaction in every respect. He has not spared labor nor money to get the best results. The barn he has now completed for St. Mary's Indian School is a very creditable piece of work.

I mentioned to you that I wish to occupy the new barn as soon as possible. The old buildings must come down at once. The ground which they occupy must be prepared for cultivation, the soil is very rich and therefore will be exceptionally good for this year's garden. Do you think that the Dpt. will object to occupying the new barn at once, though the last coat of painting on the outside is not on. The Contractor tells me that he has no objection. An early reply will oblige me greatly.

Dear Mr. Daunt, I am sending you herewith Certificate No. 3 in favor of Mr. H. Brock, for labor and material on the barn for St. Mary's Indian Boarding School, Mission, B.C.--Dpt. File No.

119704-5A. If you compare this certificate with the others previously sent to the Dpt. you will see that a slight mistake has been made. After the line "labour and material in the building at first certoficate", read \$4,111.10 instead of \$3,700.00---Again, after the next line "additional at second certificate" read \$3,222.25 instead of \$2,900.00.--Certificates are issued for 90% of labor and material actually in the building when they are sent to Ottawa. The mistake did not matter much. However, if you think it advisable, please have former certificates corrected accordingly.

Last week, when you visited St. Mary's, your attention was called to a ditch dug by the Contractor, Mr. Brock, in connection with root celler. You still remember the length and depth of it (80 ft. and 8-9-10 ft.), the purpose thereof being to keep this ce lar absolutely free from water.

When digging it, a spring was found in a corner, hence the need of an outlet. Mr. Brock could not possibly foresee this geological freak. I do not think that he should suffer loss because of it. The sum of \$97.50 was spent by him in labor.

Will you be kind enough to recommend that compensation be given him and that an additional extra of \$97.50 be paid him.

You will oblige me greatly by recommending also to the Dpt. that eaves-trough be attached to the roof of the new barn. We have a great deal of rain, and unless water is taken care of in a proper manner and carried away, there will an "awful mess" around the building. This addition to plans would cost the Dpt. only 275.80, viz. 170 ft. of eaves-trough at 30¢ per foot, 56 ft. of down pipes @ 30¢ per foot, 4 elbows @ 2.00 each. You will remember that Mr. Cairns, the Inspector of Indian Schools, strongly recommended this improvement.

I beg to forward herewith Requisition No.3 calling for a payment of \$3,339.60 to Mr. H. Brock, Contractor for the barn for St. Mary's Mission Boarding School at Mission, B.C., together with a letter received from the Principal in connection therewith.

It will be noticed that the Contractor has been put to considerable expense, in connection with providing drainage from the root cellar, and I shall be glad to learn whether the Department is disposed to assist him in this respect, as he could hardly forsee the circumstances in bidding for the work.

I would also strongly recommend that eaves-trough be attached to the roof of the barn, the climate at Mission is exceedingly wet, and unless— the water is pro-perly taken care of, it will be impossible to keep the surroundings of the building clean and dry, if this is not completed.

You attention is also directed to Father Duplanil's remarks concerning the silo, and which any farmer will endorse.

In view of the wet weather usually experienced at this time of the year, it will in all probability be impossible for the Contractor to paint the outside of the barn until April or May, and as the building is needed by the School, and as it has already been finished inside, I shall be glad to have authority of the Department for its occupation and use before the outside painting is done. I took this point up with the Contractor and he expressed his willingness, provided the School took over the insurance as it would hardly be fair to expose him to lose while they were occupying the premises. insurance,

## Mounting of The Papec Cutter

Our Method of Mounting the Papec Cutter has Attracted Wide Attention and Won Approval of Farmers Everywhere



The Papec Mounting is strongly constructed of steel channels—there are no wooden parts to twist and warp. There are but few parts, and nothing to get out of order. The Papec style of mounting does not have to be so heavy and massive as on most cutters. The weight is properly distributed throughout. For the style "R" 10-inch cutter, we can furnish either a four wheel mount or a mount of the trailer type, with but two wheels, as shown on page 13. The two wheel mount is an innovation but is practical for moving short distances and will, no doubt, be appreciated by purchasers of this size, owing to the reduced cost.


In setting up the cutter it is only necessary to put up the pipe. The table does not have to be put on or adjusted—all is ready for business but the pipe. When through cutting ensilage, just take down the pipe. The table does not have to be removed or propped up. No other cutter can be set up or taken down as quickly as the Papec.

The Tongue is easily removed, so that load may be driven close to the cutter. Neck-yoke and double-trees are not included in the price of mount.

The Feed Table is located at the right height for the feeder to stand on the ground and feed the corn comfortably. This enables a man to feed faster than when obliged to stand upon a box or a specially constructed sideboard. A load of corn may be driven up close to feeding end of table, where it can be most conveniently handled.







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### The Peter Hamilton Mower



The Peter Hamilton Mower is especially well adopted for cutting the hay grown on Canadian farms. It is strong and rigid in every part, has great traction power, is easy to draw and operate and absolutely dependable under all conditions, even the most difficult. Nothing but the best materials are used in its construction, and it is carefully built by competent mechanics.

The Main Frame is very staunch—there are no weak spots in it. The drive wheels are high with broad face. There is no lost motion—when the mower goes forward the knives cut.

The Push Bar is a steel forging made in one piece, especially heavy and stiff, and is connected at front and rear of the main frame as shown in the illustration. This Bar has adjusting nuts at the front end for lining up the bar, or centering the knife. You always have perfect alignment on Peter Hamilton Mowers.

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One Piece Main Frame

The Cutter Bar is of Cold Reiled Steel reinforced with a rib running the entire length of the bar, making it strong and rigid enough to ensure a frictionless and smooth running knife. The knife itself is held firmly in place by means of substantial holders and long steel wearing plates against which it runs. These wearing plates are easily replaced when worn and are quite inexpensive.

The Pitman is long and made of best second growth hickory or oak with forged steel jaws at both ends. The Pitman Box is fitted with brass wearing surface and self-acting oil retainers which prevents loss of oil and effectually lubricates the wearing surfaces.

The Tilting Lever can be fixed to give a free adjustment, allowing the guards to adjust themselves automatically to the unevenness of the ground. The guards can be tilted up or down without moving the Cutter Bar backwards or forwards, or out of line with the pitman and frame. A powerful foot lever raises the bar clear of the ground when turning corners, or passing over roots or stones. In raising

the bar the outer shoe is raised from the ground first, eliminating all danger of the bar catching on the obstacle. A strong adjustable coil spring, which, as well as assisting the operator in raising the bar also, to a certain extent, carries it on the wheels, thus avoiding considerable friction on the ground, and giving more power for the working parts of the machine.

All Bearings throughout the Mower are either fitted with Roller Bearings or Renewable Frictionless Bearings. The Gears are all accurately made and snugly fitted, so that there is no lost motion. Perfect gears and perfect alignment result in an easy running noiseless machine.

Peter Hamilton Mowers are built in three sizes. Cutter Bars being four and one-half feet, five feet and six feet long. On the six-foot Mower the wheels are larger and farther apart than on the smaller sizes.

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#### No. 4 Steel Rake



Every farmer, who has ever used a No. 4 Peter Hamilton Rake, will tell you that this rake not only rakes up a bigger wind-row and leaves it clearer after dumping, but that it also cleans up the field better than any other rake. The reasons are, the wheels are high in diameter. The Teeth have a big gather and when dumped, lift clear of the wind-row. They rake clean because the high carbon, oil-tempered teeth are curved to bring them well under the rake, so that they slide along the ground picking up all the hay.

The Frame throughout is heavy angle steel, thoroughly braced and trussed so that there is no danger of the rake ever sagging or becoming twisted.

The Self-Dumping Device is one of the most popular features of this rake; it operates from either wheel, a slight pressure on the Foot Lever being sufficient to throw the dump rods into engagement with the Teeth in each hub, where they are held until the Rake Head is raised to its highest point, and the hay is dropped.



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Dumping Rods can be turned end for end, and also interchanged, giving four wears instead of only one.

The Trip Casting, against which the Dump Rod Casting strikes to drop the Teeth, is adjustable to accommodate the height of the dump to heavy or light hay; its action is exactly the same whether turning a corner or raking straight ahead. In all cases the teeth drop closely behind the windrow. In driving a fast walking horse on an ordinary rake, the teeth do not drop quick enough, thereby leaving a strip of unraked hay. You can adjust this difficulty on the No. 4 All Steel Rake to suit the horse (fast or slow).

Another Point. It is possible without wrench or hammer to change the raking position of the Teeth, as it is desirable sometimes to run them higher from the ground. For instance, they should not run as close over wet and boggy ground as over a smooth, dry meadow. Simply by changing the connection, any position of the Teeth can be secured.

In every part it is light, strong and durable, and in ease of operation and capacity for work, it has no equal.





This cut shows the details of the sections to which the teeth are attached. You see, instead of having the different sections of teeth attached to one solid frame we have provided two frames, which give the teeth more independent action. All three rows cultivate to an even depth, and to the depth that you want to cultivate, instead of the back teeth going deeper than the front teeth. Furthermore, having so many sections gives the teeth more freedom of action, so that if one tooth catches on a stone or root only two or three are jerked out of the ground instead of one-third or one-half of the teeth in the machine. In hard or rough ground this feature will be especially appreciated. A ridge and a dead furrow can be cultivated at the same time, because more or less pressure can be applied to any section of teeth as desired.

The Teeth are made from an extra high grade of steel, and are very strong and reinforced with our patented helpers, which never come loose.


The Points are reversible, giving double wear.

The Teeth are divided into three rows, so that there is no danger of clogging. The Teeth are attached to the sections by a steel clip, and permits the setting of the points ahead or behind as desired for different kinds of land. This clip has a bulldog grip, which never gives up.

The 13 Tooth Cultivator has 6 Sections of Teeth.

The 17 Tooth Cultivator has 8 Sections of Teeth.

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This cut shows the Lifting Lever, Lift Spring, and the method of applying the pressure to the different sections of the teeth. The Lift Spring works both ways, helps to raise the teeth, and also helps to force them into the ground. The lever is easily worked from either the seat or the ground, and gives absolute control over the machine.

The Pole can be adjusted to suit different sizes of horses, and can easily be changed from the centre to one side for three horses, and can be removed for storing.

The Draw Clevice is adjustable. That is, it can be moved up or down to suit the different conditions and different widths.

This Cultivator is also the best Weed Cutter that you can get, and for this purpose extra wide steels to replace the reversible points are provided, if ordered.





This cut of the detail of the drag bar shows the foot tripped back after having caught on a stone or root. After the obstacle is passed it flies back automatically into place again. Notice how strong and rigid the drag bars are, and also that there are no springs or other projections on the underside to catch and drag weeds and grass.

The Relief Spring is the most successful yet used on this kind of Cultivator, and holds the foot steady, except when it catches, and then it always brings the foot back into place. There is no danger of it catching. The Wedge can be adjusted to allow the relief spring to trip easier, or hold more rigid, as required. This trip is all steel, no castings to break.

This Cultivator is an ideal tool for working up to, and under fruit trees of all descriptions. It is low and the wheels are set inside the frame, so that there is no danger of taking the bark off the trees. It is built with nine teeth, but extensions can be added to both sides, giving either eleven or thirteen teeth as required. The teeth are in three rows and provided with Reversible Points and Helpers. Thistle Cutters or wide points can also be used. This Cultivator will do excellent work the field or elsewhere, although it is not intended to cultivate as deep as the ordinary field Cultivator. The pole can be adjusted to suit the different heights of horses.

Throughout it is scientifically constructed so as to handle the largest quantities of Corn, in the least time, and with the least requirements of power

The Frame is built of selected Canadian Maple, thoroughly dried, mortised and tenoned together so that it is eternally rigid.



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The Blower Case is constructed of high carbon steel, sufficiently thick and hard to withstand the tremendous wear which goes on the inside of a Blower Case. It is extra well riveted together, and securely held in place.

The Knife Wheel is a Solid Steel Casting, not grey iron, or mild steel, but real steel, and there is no possible chance of this knife wheel flying to pieces from excessive speed. The Tornado is a "Safety First" machine in every respect. The Knife is securely keyed on a Cold Rolled Shaft 134 inches in diameter.

The Knives are of high grade steel and very heavy, but at the same time not too stiff to be properly adjusted to the cutting plate. This adjustment is made by means of set screws provided with a lock nut preventing it coming loose. This fine adjustment not only allows this machine to successfully cut corn, but also straw and hay as well.




These set screws do not simply screw into the casting, but are provided with a nut on each side.

The fans are constructed of steel riveted on to the drum with hot rivets so that there is absolutely no danger of them coming loose. They are so placed that besides creating a strong current of air they also throw the corn with tremendous force up the nine.

The mouth piece is enlarged at the opening so as to gather in the corn, thus increasing its capacity to a great extent.



The Bottom Roller is toothed, and the Top Roller corrigated, and will everlastingly pull the corn in, no matter how it is fed to it, or in what shape it is, and holds it tightly while cutting it.

The Top Roller is provided with two pressure springs close to the end which exerts a constant pressure on the top roller. This Top Roller is self-conforming in accordance with even or uneven feeding. It can be higher or lower at either end if there should happen to be more or less corn at either side of the mouth piece, and at the same time runs perfectly free.

The Main Shaft Bearings are large babbitted boxes fitted with hard oil cups. The Gears throughout are extra heavy and cannot break.

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The Reverse Gear is on a slow running Counter Shaft so that no matter how fast the machine is running it can be reversed without damaging the Reverse Gear in the slightest.

The sides of the Travelling Feed Table can be taken off and the travelling feed table folded up for transportation. The extra feed table can be placed on either side of the travelling feed table as required.

POWER.—The power required depends to some extent on how hard the machine is fed and the height to which the corn is to be elevated. A 14 H.P. Steam Engine makes an ideal power. We have, however, successfully run this machine with a 12 H.P. Gas Engine.

CAPACITY.—Capacities differ to a great extent, according to conditions, of both power and corn. Our experience has been, however, that it is easy to cut from eight to ten tons per hour, when the corn is cut 5% inch long.

The Pipes are constructed of heavy sheet steel, and the deflector is strongly built.

When these machines are ordered we usually supply one extra set of knives, one pulley, lagged, and thirty feet of pipe. If any different equipment is required it should be mentioned in the order.

Cuts-3 s inch, -5 s inch-1 inch and 1½ inches.

The Mouth is 12 inches wide and raises 5 inches.



This is our Carrier type of machine equally well adapted to fill your silo or to cut feed for you during the winter.

This machine is most substantially built, having the same Gears and Feeding mechanism as the Blower machine just described. Strong enough to stand driving with a heavy engine and easy enough driven to be handled by the lightest Gasoline motor.



The Knives are manufactured out of an extra high-grade of Steel and are guaranteed to stand up to their work. They are easily adjusted up to the Cutting Plate. These Knives are concaved-shaped, cutting from the outside rim towards the centre with a shearing cut all the way across, giving you full value of the momentum of the wheel on every cut.


The material is clean cut, no chopping or long ends. When a light power is available this scheme makes an ideal Silo Filler. It cuts corn perfectly, leaving stalks and cobs all the same lengths. Carriers deliver it into the Silo in a very satisfactory manner. Of course you cannot cut as much as with a Blower, but you do not need as much help as with a Blower.

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The Elevating Carriers are very strongly constructed, have extra deep sides, and the Chains return on top. This prevents the cut stuff from blowing out and eliminates a litter underneath the Carriers.



#### Universal Jack

These Carriers can be mounted on a stand when it is only desired that they run straight out from the machine, but a Universal Jack can be supplied which will enable the Carriers to be swung around to any direction within a radius of a half circle.

This machine can be supplied with either a Plain Feed Table or a Travelling Feed Table.





#### The No. 6 Straw Cutter



This Machine has a 9-inch mouth and the rollers raise about 2½ inches. It can be operated by hand or by a small gas engine. The Frame is rigid and the machine parts strongly constructed. some two years ago, shortly after my a pointment, I approached the Department about the matter. The Institution had then two kitchens, an old fashion laundry, etc. I wrote about very much needed changes and improvements. The Department

was very kind. we have already a new para.

wince then I find that the accommodations afforded by wt. are not sufficient for the number of children of school Mary's age in the district; they are not sufficient for the number of applications I receive every year. This matter has been the subject of a great deal of consideration and discussion . The matter was discussed with Mr. woott, Deputy Superintendent General of Indian Affairs, at the time of his visit to St. Mary's. after examining the buildings. Mr. scott agrees with Father Welch and myself, that the best way and therefore the only way is the erection of a new School, large enough to accommodate all the children of the District. This new school is to be erected as soon as possible. Meantime I think that some amelioration in the laundry should be considered at once. The old fashion, back braking laundry of St. Mary's should be e uipped with some modern and labor saving devices. I will write more fully on this matter within a few days.



When I visited St. Mary's Mission Indian School last fall the Reverend Principal pointed out to me the improvements which he had made to the laundry building and equipment. Father Duplanil has spent considerable money in remodelling the laundry and installing proper equipment. He asked me if the Department would give him some assistance in this matter and I advised him that if he would forward the accounts for mechanical equipment I would submit them to you for consideration. He has today forwarded vouchers covering the cost of a steam boiler, a washer and an extractor, amounting to \$837.15. This is only a portion of the total cost to the Principal of the laundry and equipment, and I would recommend that the amount of these accounts be refunded to the Reverend Principal in the way of assistance to him in the work which he has carried out.

Mr. Ferrier states that funds are available at the present time to cover this amount.



I have the honour to forward you herewith, a letter which I have received from the Rev. Father Welch, and which is self-explanatory.

There are at the moment, 107 Grant earning pupils in St Mary's School, and in addition, the Fathers invariably carry a number without recompense.

In an institution of this size, outbreaks calling for an isolation hospital, have always to be reckoned with, and I would most strongly recom-mend that any assistance possible be given the Fathers in meeting the cost of these very necessary buildings.

There are at present seven cases of Diphtheria being cared for in these buildings, and if they were not available, the cost to the Department of Public isolation, care, and treatment would probably be in excess of the amount now asked by the Fathers.







With reference to the letter of the Deputy Superintendent General, File No. 153-1-5 of October 20th, I beg to forward you herewith Agency Voucher No. 604 for \$650.00, representing an allowance made by the Department to the Principal of St. Mary's Mission Indian Boarding School, in respect to a provision of two buildings used as an isolation hospital during an outbreak of small-pox and diphtheria at the School.

Receipted accounts to the amount of \$757.73 are attached hereto, and show the expenditure incurred by the School in this connection, though they only asked for \$650.00 reimbursement. Among those the actual price paid for the buildings was \$440.00, the balance representing the necessary equipment.

I have examined these two buildings and estimate that the lumber used in their construction would have cost about \$1,350.00 without labour. One of the buildings is very well finished indeed and itself is worth the sum proposed as reimbursement for the whole. The other the sum proposed as reimbursement for the whole. The other building is not so weather proof, but it is good lumber, which can easily be improved to suit any conditions. Altogether the sum of \$650.00 represents but a fraction of the value of the two buildings and equipment placed therein.

I would therefore recommend that reimburse-ment to the amount of \$650.00 be made to the School, as indicated in the correspondence above referred to.





for the last ten years. The repair man tells me that it is useless to try to repair it #. It is highly dangerous for the fire can be seen through it in many places, such as around the oven doors and the smoke box, etc. I could replace for a couple of hundred dollars or thereabouts.

Two other items of a somewhat different nature, should, I feel, be brought to your attention. The pipe line which supplies water and light to the school is giving out. It has held long beyond the guaranteed time, but now the wire with the pipe is wound is badly rusted through and the pressure is continually bursting the pipe. It consists of about a mile of six inch wooden pipe.


The laundry building is decayed and delapidated beyond repair and leans so much from the perpendicular as to be dangerous. A fall of heavy snow on the roof or a strong wind might bring it down. Yet it has to be occupied one day a week to wash the clothes of the school and another day to wash the Indian children.

Mr, Daunt has made me acquainted with \*\*\* some of the financial difficulties of the present time, yet it is with confidence that I appeal to you, especially for the fire escapes and range, and, in anticipation, thank you.


Dear Sir:

Permit me to lay before you a situation which, I feel, calls for immediate attention. Both the boys' and the girls' buildings here are without fire escapes of any kind. The buildings are of wood and of three stories and the children sleep on the top floors. Is a fire started during the night and got as well under way before being discovered as fires often do, it is doubtful if one of the fifty odd girls would get out alive and the boys' chances are but little better.

In the case of the girls' building, there is one stairs and it lands in a hall situated near the centre of the building and having no door opening to the outside. The houses are old, dusty, dry and veritable tinder boxes: the electric wiring as of the oldfashioned kind with naked wires; auring cold periods in winter, stoves are stoked to full capacity in farious rooms; and added to all this, is the everpresent danger of the children setting the house afire purposely. Therefore, the danger of fire occuring is about as great as could be found, while the danger to life incase of fire, is, if anyghing, greater still. It would be a case of fifty children on a third floor with sheer walls all around and the only stairs leading down into the heart of the burning building.

There is another smaller matter, for which I also crave your indulgence. The kitchen range used in the boys' building he very old and thoroughly burned out. It is the one on which most of the cooking of the school is done. The buying of a new one has been considered periodically



I beg to forward you herewith a communication addressed to yourself, received by me under date of August 13th from the Rev. Principal of St. Mary's Mission Residential School, in which he requests Departmental assistance for the erection of fire escapes, the installation of a new pipe line, and the erection of a new laundry building.

This letter was held over while we investigated conditions thoroughly, and I enclose Blue Print and estimate received from the Westminster Iron Works Limited, calling for the sum of \$1,062.00 in connection with the fire escapes.

I personally consider that the School should have some system of fire escapes, but in view of the fact that the buildings are old, and that some time in the near future it will become necessary to replace them, I do not feel that it would be good policy to spend so much money. I consider, however, that wooden outside structures might well be erected upon both the girls' and boys' buildings, and that the Principal's request would be reasonable to the extent of perhaps a total of \$200.00.

With regards to the pipe line, this is largely a matter which should be covered by the probable date of the erection of a new School at Mission. If it is proposed to build one in the immediate future, the matter might as well be allowed to wait. On theother hand there is no doubt that the pipe line is in bad shape, and that as the water supply of any future school must of necessity be derived from the present source, a pipe line would not be an absolute waste, as the greater part of it would be utilized for the new buildings. I appreciate, of course, that the cost in this latter case would be met from the building appropriation instead of from current revenue, as would be necessary now.

The laundry building while old and settled out of shape, is in no immediate danger, and I would recommend that no change be made while the existing buildings remain in use.

Dear Sir:

The pipe line, which supplies water, light and power to this school, is badly in need of being renewed. Father Welch spoke with you on the matter, I understand, when he was in Ottawa in December last. He asked me to furnish you with some idea of the probable cost of the replacement. The following is what I have found out on the matter.

There is required,6000 feet,of 8 inch, wooden pipe, for a head of 275 ft. The old pipe is 6 inch, but we loose much power in friction, and, in consequence, our lights are very poor. Iron pipe has a very uncertain life in this country, and wood pipe is preferable, especially the quality now made, and having the new couplings.

A new and straighter line needs to be surveyed for the pipe and the pipe and the connections installed. A new dam is required at the intake. Also, a new dynamo. The original dynamo is in very shaky condition, and the electrician of Mission City who repairs it for us says it cannot be further repaired and may go to pieces any moment. It is of seven horse power, but the new one whould be of nine.

I have asked the manager of the Mission Public Service Co., which supplies water to Mission City, to have his men go over the situation, and give me his estimate of the probable cost. His answer is "About nine thousand dollars," This is meant to cover everything.

With reference to your letter No.153-1-5 of October 1st, I beg to forward you herewith a communication received by me, and which I notice is addressed to the Deputy Superintendent General, giving an idea of the requirements in connection with the installation of renewals to the water pipe line at St. Mary's Mission Residential School.

The Dynamo which supplies the Institution with electric light is also in a very shaky condition and requires replacement.

There is no doubt that the pipe line is in very bad condition and also the dynamo is quite unfit for the work it is to perform, the cost of replacements however, are high and I think a great deal depends upon whether it is the intention of the Department to build a new School in the near future.

If the present Institution is to be maintained, I would recommend that the Dominion Water Power Branch be asked to look into the matter, and submit a report as to the cost of the necessary replacements, which will certainly have to be made if the School is to be retained on present lines.



Mission City, B.C. The following is a report on
the condition of the existing plant and suggested replacements and improvements.

# ST. MARY'S MISSION SCHOOL-


This school is situated on the north bank of the Fraser river about one mile east of Mission City, B.C. It is a boarding school for Indian children, owned and operated by the Order of Mary Immaculate. About one hundred and sixty children are usually in attendance.

A farm is operated in connection with the school, the property comprising about 480 acres of which about 160 acres are under cultivation. The school buildings are of frame construction and were built quite a number of years ago.

## PRESENT WATER SYSTEM-

The accompanying plan shows the layout of the present system. A small concrete dam
about five feet in height forms a reservoir of
about 10,000 gallons capacity in the creek bed.
A six inch pipe line 4,300 feet long conveys

water to the school. The pipe is tapped at various points to supply the different school buildings. The present pipe is in very bad condition and practically irreparable. To the fact that this pipe was poorly laid and in many places without cover may be attributed its comparatively short lifetime.

#### LIGHTING PLANT-

An extension of the pipe line for 1,000 feet provides an additional head sufficient to develop power for lighting purposes. A 24" Pelton type wheel belt connected to a 7 K.W. generator forms the electric lighting plant.


The Pelton, although in a bad state of repair, furnishes sufficient power to operate the generator but this machine probably does not produce in excess of 4 K.W. due to a speed below its rating and to the fact that the commutator is practically worn out. No governor is used, the water being turned on at night and allowed to run until the pipe empties.

The transmission line also requires replacement. The wires being bare of insulation and always in danger of short circuit.

#### OTHER SERVICES -

In addition to the services before mentioned several other operations are performed. A tap from the main line leads to the laundry where a Pelton operates the laundry machinery. Another tap leads to the barn and woodyard where a home-

made Pelton type wheel drives the threshing machine and wood saw.

Two inside hydrants and four outside are intended to provide fire protection. Two of the latter are in such close proximity to the school buildings as to be almost useless and in fact a menace to the supply in the event of a fire. Only two hundred feet of hose of small size, and now almost useless, is available.


It may be readily understood that with all the tasks required of the very small water supply there are many times when a shortage becomes acute. For none of the services is there ever quite enough power developed to adequately fill the necessities.

#### WATER SUPPLY-

The water supply for the school is derived from Durien or Mission Creek. It is carried by pipe line to the school eite, a distance of approximately of a mile. This water supply also furnishes power for lighting and other power purposes. Durien creek rises north of the town of Mission in a country that is unsettled and which will probably remain so for many years, the country being fairly heavily timbered and with very poor soil.

The present supply has been in use about fifteen years. The school authorities are well satisfied with the quality of the water and I am informed that no sickness has ever been attributed to it.

bout 3 c.f.s. in winter to 0.75 c.f.s. in midsummer. At the time of my visit, the first week in April, the flow over the dam spillway was 0.9 c.f.s. in addition to which there was a very great loss along the pipe line, possibly as much as 0.5 c.f.s.


## POWER AVAILABLE-

The minimum flow of Durien creek may be taken as 0.75 c.f.s.; this flow, however, does not determine the useful power. The power needs in midsummer when the flow is lowest are very small, while in winter they are about twice that required in summer. It may safely be estimated on the past fifteen years performance of the present plant that the useful flow is about one c.f.s. This should develop on a Pelton wheel with a useful head of 230 feet, about 15 H.P. considering a generating efficiency of 85%, about 9 K.W. would be available for use on the lighting circuit at 125 volts.

## POWER REQUIREMENTS -

There are about 225 lamps at present in use of an average of 40 watts each which, under the present system of operating the lighting plant, would require a plant of about 10 K.W. capacity for the reason that there is no means available of reducing the output of the generator. Normally the

requirements should not exceed 60% of the full load. It is safe to assume that the 9 K.W. available would be sufficient for all lighting requirements.

This amount of power would be ample to operate all other services combined, during the day time. The laundry needs occur only once a week and at no time when light is required. The development of 9 K.W. would carry one half the lighting load and operate either the wood-cutting plant or the laundry at the same time, all that should be considered necessary.

The lighting needs of a future new school would be considerably less than present requirements as many of the buildings now in use would be dispensed with.

## PROPOSED PLANT RENEWAL-


If properly managed, the present water supply is adequate to fill the needs of the school for domestic purposes, fire protection, and power, for many years.

The whole system requires replacement, the material being in a state of decay and the equipment practically worn out.

The plan suggested for replacement follows, with few exceptions, the general idea of the
present system. An effort has been made to conserve as much as possible the small, though adequate water supply.

It is proposed to replace the present main from the intake to the school with a pipe of

a larger size making connection with the present service points as shown on the accompanying plan and profile. In the school area the pipe line is kept well back from the present buildings so that new buildings will not require a removal of location. The pipe line is to be buried with a minimum of 2.5 feet of cover.

Four hydrants are provided for fire protection service located at points to best serve the present school buildings as well as any future structures.

At the intake it is proposed to provide a reservoir of 30,000 gallons capacity. This is primarily for emergency use in case of fire when the electric lighting plant requires practically the whole flow of the stream.

## ELECTRIC POWER PLANT-

It is proposed to extend the pipe line as at present to a point near the existing power house to obtain all available head. This extension would require approximately 600 feet of pipe.

The power plant would consist of an 18 inch Pelton type water wheel connected by a silent chain drive to a 9 K.W. generator; the water wheel to be controlled by a mechanical governor.

The total cost of the combined water system and power plant as suggested would be \$10,340. In addition there would be the cost of installing motors for operating Laundry and for other uses.

#### OTHER SERVICES-

It is proposed to replace with electric motors the present water driven services in order to conserve the water supply.

For the laundry a 5 H.P. motor is necessary which would be hooked into the present transmission line by a short branch.

For threshing and wood cutting purposes a 5 H.P. motor is also necessary; this would also be connected to the present transmission line by a short extension.

The cost of these installations would be \$700.00, including cost of power line extensions. This is somewhat less than replacing the present system with a similar one and providing new drains to carry away the tailings, which would amount to \$556.00 in the case of the threshing and wood cutting installation, and \$325.00 in the case of the laundry.

## FIRE PROTECTION-

It is suggested that 700 feet of hose and a reel be provided for fire protection purposes to replace the present hose which is in poor shape.

The cost of this would be \$660.00

#### SUMMARY OF COST-

The total cost of the installation as proposed would be \$11,700. A proportion of the cost of pipe line for water supply suggested is for the use of the power plant. A system for purely domestic use and fire protection could be installed for \$7,000; so that the actual investment for power and lighting is \$4,000.

The yearly cost of power and light, presuming a lifetime of 25 years for the plant would be \$360.00 (Interest and depreciation 9%) This is at a rate of approximately two cents per K.W. Hour as compared with seven cents per K.W. Hour quoted by the British Columbia Electric Company for the same service.

Attached hereto are summary of cost, bill of material, and plans of plant suggested as being the most suitable for the school.

There is an item of \$7,000 in the Main Estimates for the provision of a suitable water supply system at the St. Mary's Indian Residential School, Mission, B. C. The Dominion Water Power Branch have the matter in hand and have estimated the cost of the activity at \$7,000, which includes fire protection. I wish to recommend that Mr. Chene give the necessary instructions to the Dominion Water Power.

It appears that \$4,700 is required for the provision of a suitable electric light plant at this institution. There are no funds to proceed with this at the present time, but I shall make a note for next year's Estimates. Before expending this amount of money on electric light plant, I believe we should seriously consider less expensive schemes, as the building is not destined to be used for very many years.



SIR:-

I beg to forward you herewith an estimate received from the Rev. Principal of St. Mary's Mission Residential School, regarding necessary repairs to the buildings.

With regard to the first item, the roofs are leaking badly and in wet weather a number of pails are required to catch the water which comes through, I would certainly recommend that thisbe attended to as soon as possible.

- (a) Builting Repairs: Owing to the extreme age of the baildings, the steam heating, particularly in the girls' building proved inadequate to save the pipes from freezing, several were put out of commission, and while temporarily fixed it is absolutely necessary that the above be attended to as soon as possible.
- (b) Carpentery: A good deal of work in this connection is necessary to stop drafts, otherwise making the buildings more frost proof, and I would recommend that this be done.
- (c) Plastering, Kalsomining and Painting: This is necessary to repair damages caused by the weather last winter, where walls have been injured as well as damage by rain coming through the roofs.
- (d) Stoves: The steam heating being inadequate to properly take care of the girls' building, about seven stoves are necessary to keep it in a habitable condition during the winter months. During the cold weather, it is now impossible to keep the children at their work on account of the low temperature in the buildings. I would recommend that an appropriation be made to this end.



SIR: -

In reply to your letter dated the 22nd ultimo, File No. 153-1-5, I beg to forward you herewith a detailed estimate in connection with the repairs required at St. Mary's Indian Residential School, amounting to \$838.50, with an additional sum of \$328.00 for the necessary stoves etc., for heating, making a total of \$1,166.50.

These repairs are absolutely necessary, and unless the Department intend to erect a new school in the near future, there is other work that should be carried out. The Laundry is beyond repair, as it is very old and has been repaired so often that nothing more can be done to it.

The Stoves, stove boards and galvanized protective stands to protect wood work, will be installed when the other repairs are being carried out, so I am sure that this will be satisfactory for fire prevention.

I would strongly recommend that the necessary authority to proceed with the work be wired to this office, as the School Authorities wish to have these repairs carried out when the children are away on their holidays, and as they leave on the 15th instant, it will give very little time.



Sir:

I have your letter of the 14th instant, with reference to repairs at the St. Mary's Indian Residential School. In reply I have to confirm official night letter of today's date, as follows: -

"Reference your letter fourteenth instant Department cannot agree to supply stoves. Will allow one hundred and fifty dollars for materials for calcimining, painting and repairs. Labour should be provided by school management. Plumber may be engaged to make most urgent repairs but his bill must not be over two hundred dollars."

In explanation, I wish to point out that the Department cannot favourably consider supplying supplementary heating units because of the danger from fire. Our funds are strictly limited this year and only the most urgent work can be authorized. The school management must provide as much labour as possible.




